TO THE PRESIDENT AND MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF PHILADELPHIA:

I am herewith returning to you as disapproved Bill Number 051144-AA, which would amend Title 14 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Zoning and Planning,' by amending Chapter 14-104 entitled "Non-Conforming Structures and Uses," by amending provisions relating to the reconstruction of non-conforming structures.

This Bill amends Section 14-104 of the Zoning Code to allow properties zoned "R-1", "R-1A", "R-2", "R-3", "R-4" or "R-5" in the Tenth Council District to be reconstructed where any structure containing a non-conforming use or being non-conforming as to area, height, floor area or bulk, in whole or in part, is destroyed by fire or an Act of God or is legally condemned. Insofar as the legislation permits non-conforming structures that are destroyed by a fire, act of God or natural disaster to be rebuilt in the same footprint of the original property without a zoning variance, I cannot support this measure for the following reasons.

Until 2003, if a non-conforming property was destroyed or substantially destroyed by fire, upon rebuilding it could no longer be built to its non-conforming specifications; it had to conform to the zoning of the neighborhood. If the property was only partially destroyed, the building was allowed to retain its non-conforming character. In 2003, Council adopted an exception to the foregoing in the Third District whereby properties that were totally or substantially destroyed by fire could be rebuilt to their non-conforming specifications, but only if the block was largely intact (i.e., seventy five percent of the structures in the block are still in place).

Bill No. 051144-A would adopt a similar exception for the Tenth District (though without the limitation that the block needs to be largely intact). Properties destroyed by fire would be allowed to rebuild to their prior non-conforming characteristics, regardless how little or much of the property was destroyed. Although the intent of the legislation is to alleviate the burden of Tenth District residents in seeking zoning variances, the larger public interest in creating a uniform and transparent Zoning Code is of paramount concern to me and would be frustrated by this legislation.

As the City's Chief Executive, I am charged with the duty of ensuring the same opportunity for all citizens who are similarly situated. Insofar as this legislation

carves out a different set of rules for residents of the Tenth District that may not be enjoyed by all citizens, I cannot support it.

Therefore, despite the laudable legislative intent, I cannot approve of Bill 051144-AA as enacted.

WHEREAS, The Philadelphia Hero Scholarship Fund was created in 1954 after 10 firefighters died in an explosion at a North Philadelphia chemical plant; and

WHEREAS, The Fund was established to provide college scholarships for children of Philadelphia Police Officers and Firefighters killed or severely disabled in the line of duty; and

WHEREAS, Since its inception, the Fund has assisted hundreds of students attend and graduate from various colleges and universities; and

WHEREAS, The Fund's main source of funding is through the sale of tickets to the annual Hero Scholarship Thrill Show. The show attracts hundreds of people to watch local celebrities, sport figures and demonstrations by police units and firefighters; and

WHEREAS, It is uncertain whether the 2006 Hero Scholarship Thrill Show will take place due to administrative decision-making; and

WHEREAS, Recently, the Fund has allegedly mistreated widows and children of fallen firefighters and police officers after the Fund was asked why the scholarship guidelines were changed and why scholarship monies were being held; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA, That authority be given to the Legislative Oversight Committee to hold public hearings to investigate the Hero Scholarship Fund scholarship award guidelines, the Fund's administrative decision-making and the status of the 2006 Thrill Show.

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Committee is authorized in furtherance of such investigation to issue subpoenas as may be necessary to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of documents to the full extent authorized under Section 2-401 of the Home Rule Charter.

WHEREAS, On August 29, 2005, Hurricane Katrina left many in New Orleans homeless, particularly those in the poorest areas of New Orleans- the 9th Ward; and

WHEREAS, Government relief efforts have been grossly inadequate leaving many to suspect that because many of the hardest hit victims are poor and black, federal relief agencies simply didn't prioritize delivering much needed aid; and

WHEREAS, Some seven months after Hurricane Katrina, many New Orleans victims are still displaced and still in need of help cleaning mud, mold and debris from what remains of their homes; and

WHEREAS, The students of Howard University, a Historically Black College, felt a special responsibility to help the victims of Hurricane Katrina because of their ethics and cultural ties, with one student commenting that the people of New Orleans "...were just like me. They were just like my grandparents, but everything was taken away."; and

WHEREAS, More than 250 Howard students signed up and boarded buses in March 2006 for an almost 20 hour ride to New Orleans to help clean houses and gut them down their foundations so that they could be rebuilt; and

WHEREAS, The students were shocked at the devastation they witnessed with one student remarking that "The situation was nothing that you could have prepared for." and another lamenting that "It was like a third world country."; and

WHEREAS, The work required the students to wear protective suits, masks, goggles, helmets, boots and hard hats because a lot of the houses were infested with deadly mold; and

WHEREAS, Residents told the students that they, "...were so happy to see students who looked like them, who came to their aid and to show their support and their love and their concern."; and

WHEREAS, The Howard students were recognized by ABC NEWS as "Persons of the Week" for volunteering to help the Katrina victims; and

WHEREAS, We take pride in the commitment to public service and to those in need demonstrated by the students of one of the nation's oldest and most important Historically Black Colleges; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA, That we commend the students of Howard University for spending their spring break in New Orleans helping victims of Hurricane Katrina and congratulate them for being recognized as "Persons of the Week" by ABC NEWS for their important contribution to public service.

This country owes all veterans of the past, present and future the very best health care; and

WHEREAS, Over the years, veterans' organizations such as and not limited to, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, Disabled American Veterans, American Legion and the Purple Heart Association have carried the message and been instrumental in gaining small changes and continue to fight for more veterans rights; and

WHEREAS, The Redevelopment Authority of the City of Philadelphia (hereafter "Redevelopment Authority") has prepared and submitted an urban renewal plan and a redevelopment proposal for the redevelopment of the South Central Urban Renewal Area, (hereinafter "South Central"), which said plan and proposal were approved by Ordinance of the Council on December 14, 1971 as amended; and

WHEREAS, the Redevelopment Authority has prepared a disposition supplement providing, inter alia, for development controls and regulations imposed upon the redeveloper.

WHEREAS, The Redevelopment Authority has prepared a redevelopment contract for a portion of South Central, designated as Parcel No. 290 as 922 South Fifth street (the "Property"). The area of said Property is bounded as follows:

Parcel No. 290 (922 South Fifth street).

All that certain lot or piece of ground situated in the Second Ward of the City of Philadelphia beginning on the northwest corner at the intersection of South Fifth street (fifty feet wide) and Montrose street (twenty feet wide); Thence extending

northward along the westerly side of the said Fifth street twenty feet to a point; Thence extending northwestward sixty three feet two and five-eighths inches to a point; Thence extending southwestward nineteen feet seven and five-eighths inches to a point on the northerly side of the said Montrose street; Thence extending southwestward along the northerly side of the said Montrose street to the first mentioned point and place of beginning.

The said redevelopment contract is in substantial conformity with the amended urban renewal plan and the amended redevelopment proposal approved by the Council; and

WHEREAS, Chrimi Corporation desires to enter into the said redevelopment contract for the Property.

RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA, that the redevelopment contract and disposition supplement submitted by Redevelopment Authority for the redevelopment of that portion of South Central, as hereinabove more particularly described, is hereby approved. City Council authorizes the Redevelopment Authority to proceed with minor changes in substantial conformity with the hereby approved redevelopment contract and disposition supplement. The Redevelopment Authority is authorized to execute the hereby approved redevelopment contract with Chrimi Corporation (hereinafter "Redeveloper"). The Redevelopment Authority Redeveloper and the authorized to take such action in substantial conformity to the redevelopment contract as may be necessary to carry it out.

RESOLVED, The Redevelopment Authority and the Redeveloper authorized to prepare or cause to be prepared for introduction into the Council such ordinances or resolutions as may be necessary for changes in zoning, streets, alleys, public ways, street patterns, location and relocation of public utilities, and related items which are required in order to facilitate and effectuate the disposition supplement hereby redevelopment contract and Accordingly, the Council hereby declares that it will cooperate in helping to carry and requests the various officials, departments, out the redevelopment contract boards and agencies of the City having administrative responsibilities in the premises likewise to cooperate to such end and to exercise their respective functions and powers in a manner consistent with the redevelopment contract and disposition supplement.

Resolution No. 060252:Resolution urging the Pennsylvania General Assembly to work with Governor Rendell in his efforts to end Pennsylvania's reputation as the puppy-mill capital of the East.

WHEREAS, Governor Rendell has taken a pro-active stance to eradicate the problem of puppy-mills in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by convening a special task force to address the issue. This task force will soon issue a report on their findings; and

WHEREAS, In 2005 the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture licensed approximately three thousand facilities for dog breeding, boarding, and research making Pennsylvania the second largest state for puppy production; and

WHEREAS, Puppy-mills are cramped, crude facilities where unhealthy dogs are bred solely for profit. Dogs are bred from the first time they come into heat until they die. Cages are often stacked on top of each other with nothing in between, allowing urine and feces to fall through onto whatever lies below, usually other dogs, causing most mill dogs to suffer from acid burns, lesions and blindness; and

WHEREAS, Puppy-mills supply ninety-nine percent of companion dogs to pet stores, making this disturbing practice of dog milling a multi-billion dollar industry mirrored in deception, especially to consumers who unknowingly purchase pure-bred dogs born in filthy, inhumane puppy mills from pet stores; and

WHEREAS, While most puppy-mills operate outside of Philadelphia, we suffer the consequences of the problems of over population of companion animals. This year, nearly ten million companion animals will be needlessly euthanized in this country, in Philadelphia alone over twenty thousand companion animals will be killed; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA, That this Council calls upon the Pennsylvania General Assembly to work closely with the governor to eradicate the disturbing practice of puppy-milling, ending the national embarrassment of Pennsylvania being the puppy-mill capital of the East, and further showing the nation that Pennsylvania is a compassionate state to both

its human and animal citizenry.
