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The Council - Its Election, Organization, Powers and Duties

CHAPTER 3 LEGISLATION

* * *

§2-307. Legislation Affecting Zoning, Physical Development Plan, Land Subdivision, or Authorizing the Purchase or Sale of Real Estate.

The Council shall not enact any bill which shall in any manner affect any zoning ordinance, the Physical Development Plan of the City, plans of streets and revisions of such plans, and land subdivision plans or any bill which would authorize the acquisition or sale of City real estate without first receiving the recommendation thereon through the Mayor of the City Planning Commission. The approval of the Commission shall be presumed unless its recommendations are received within forty-five days from the introduction of any bill affecting plans of streets and revisions of such plans, and land subdivision plans, and within thirty days from the introduction of any other bill subject to this section, except that with respect to any particular bill, the Commission may at any time during such forty-five day or thirty day period, as the case may be, vote to extend its review period for up to an additional forty-five days, in which case the approval of the Commission shall be presumed unless its recommendation is received within such extended review period. It shall be the duty of the chief clerk of the Council to submit any such bill to the City Planning Commission immediately upon its introduction.

CHAPTER 9 DEPARTMENTAL BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

§3-911. Zoning Board of Adjustment.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment shall be composed of five appointed

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members and the Commissioner of Licenses and Inspections. The five appointed members shall be comprised of an architect, an urban planner, a traffic engineer, an attorney experienced in land use issues, and a representative of Philadelphia community groups that participate in land use issues.

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CHAPTER A-2

§A-200. Schedule.

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(7) The amendment to Section 3-911 of this Charter providing for the composition of the Zoning Board of Adjustment shall take effect January 7, 2008. WHEREAS, To address the overcrowding problem, inmates have been "shuffled" throughout the Prison System and have been housed in various areas including but not limited to sleeping on the floor of the Detention Center; and

WHEREAS, On July 25, 2006, David Rudovsky, Esquire filed a federal lawsuit against the City of Philadelphia alleging that the City is violating the U.S. Constitution for placing inmates in overcrowded prison facilities and subjecting inmates to inhumane conditions and this lawsuit follows Mr. Rudovsky's 1971 federal lawsuit, which was settled in 2000 and based on similar pleadings; and

WHEREAS, In addition to the overcrowding issue, allegations have been made that the Prison System has problems with security lapses and inaccurate headcounts, which led to an inmate escaping from the House of Corrections and a rape suspect being missing for approximately 24 hours; and

WHEREAS, The overcrowding and security issues have created an atmosphere where inmate crime, violence, and riots are more likely to occur and have produced an unsafe and severely stressful work environment for Prison System employees; now therefore, be it

Unless a patient's family was able to pay for this costly experimental treatment, these children were sent home to die; and

WHEREAS, It is for this reason the N.C.C.S. was founded - to ensure that every child with cancer is given a chance at survival. Bone marrow transplants are now routinely performed and covered by insurance, allowing the organization to expand its services to provide additional support; and

WHEREAS, The N.C.C.S. helped push this risky procedure from infancy stage to a widely acceptable form of treatment. Since its inception, the N.C.C.S. has provided over \$36 million in direct financial assistance to more than 18,000 children, and supplemental assistance through educational camps, programs and materials to thousands more; and


WHEREAS, The N.C.C.S. now works with more than 200 hospitals and pediatric oncology units throughout the United States. This non-profit, tax-exempt organization has quickly risen to become one of the largest financial aid organizations for children with cancer in the United States; now therefore

WHEREAS, Coltrane wrote, "my goal is to live the truly religious life and express it in my music, I wish for all of us happy and productive lives. My music is the spiritual expression of what I am - my faith, my knowledge, my being"; and

WHEREAS, The TraneStop Resource Institute, was named in the spirit and work ethic of John Coltrane and its emergence in 1979 filled a void and gave the City of Philadelphia and the music community a focused endeavor for sustaining the connection of the music to its uniquely African and American roots; and

WHEREAS, In Coltrane's honor, the TraneStop devotes attention, support and resources to the art form of jazz, conducts town meetings, community concerts, special educational presentations and seminars to improve the conditions of African American Classical Music in Philadelphia and around the world. TraneStop's initiatives not only seek to honor the contributions of John Coltrane but other Philadelphia connected musicians as well; and

WHEREAS, From September 1st thru 3rd of 2006, the TraneStop is presenting "The John Coltrane Jazz Festival" in honor of this great Philadelphian, and featuring, among others, Philadelphia bred, international recording artists, Archie Shepp and Billy Paul and co-hosted by State Representative John Myers and State Senator Leanna Washington; now therefore

WHEREAS, Leonel Fernández was born in Santo Domingo on December 26, 1953, to José Antonio Fernández-Collado and Yolanda Reyna-Romero; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Fernández went to public schools in New York City for the primary schooling of what would later on bloom into a brilliant professional career; and

WHEREAS, Upon his return to the country, he entered the Universidad Autónoma de Santo Domingo (UASD), establishing his domicile in the residential sector of Villa Juana, where he spent the first years of his youth; and

WHEREAS, At that time, Dr. Fernández felt attracted to the more advanced ideas emerging in the then current political debate, which would soon lead him to study the works of, whom would be his mentor and guide, Professor Juan Bosch; and

WHEREAS, With the help of Professor Juan Bosch and a host of other Dominicans, Dr. Fernández helped found the Dominican Liberation Party (PLD), at the young age of 20, in 1973; and

WHEREAS, In 1978, Dr. Fernández was bestowed a postgraduate honors degree in Law (Magna Cum Laude) entitling him to the "J. Humberto Doucudray" Award, as the most outstanding student of his class; and

WHEREAS, His college thesis, "The Crime of Public Opinion", which later would become one of the most requested books by Law scholars and the mass media, enriched the national bibliography regarding such a complex and novel subject for the nation; and

WHEREAS, From 1983 to 1990, Dr. Fernández's reputation within the

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intellectual circles by means of conferences, press articles and debates helped him hold great political positions of responsibility within his party including, apprentice of the party's doctrines, post of intermediate leader, Secretary of International Affairs and Secretary of the Press; and

WHEREAS, For his political and personal merits, in 1994, Dr. Fernández was selected by the Dominican Liberation Party as their vice-presidential candidate; and

WHEREAS, In 1996, an overwhelming majority of the PLD chose him as their candidate for President, in which he emerged successful, thus becoming the first Head of State to emerge from the PLD and one of the youngest statesman in Latin America; and

WHEREAS, After a four-year hiatus, he was elected to a second term of office in the presidential election held on May 16, 2004, with an absolute majority; now therefore

WHEREAS, "Impact fees" are monies charged by a municipality to offset increased capital costs such as water, sewer, drainage, roadways, public safety facilities, libraries, schools and parks derived from and necessary due to new development; and

WHEREAS, Several states including Florida, California, Oregon, Colorado,

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Texas, Georgia, Maine, Maryland and Vermont and several municipalities including Chicago, Denver, San Francisco and Palm Beach have assessed impact fees in an effort to recoup costs; and

WHEREAS, Most state's and municipalities that have implemented impact fees have done so by utilizing a relatively simple formula that assesses a development's financial impact on various services and infrastructure needs. These formulas have created uniform expectations for every development; and

WHEREAS, For the past several years, Philadelphia has enjoyed a construction boom that has brought new residents and businesses to the City. While Council welcomes and enjoys this construction, Council also recognizes that some developments have strained the City's services and infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, Developers often negotiate with community groups and local officials in order to secure their approval and obtain the necessary zoning permits or legislation. These negotiations often concentrate on design parameters; however, at times, developers make financial contributions in order to address the community's concerns over the impact of said development. These contributions vary in scale dependent on the neighborhood, the size of the development, the attorney, the Council district and the developer. Since negotiations are undertaken on a project-by-project basis, neither the community nor the developer has a clear set of expectations; and

WHEREAS, In order to encourage additional development while simultaneously insuring appropriate resources for every neighborhood throughout the City, developer and community expectations must be uniform; and

**CHAPTER 10
ZONING CODE COMMISSION**

SECTION 4-900. Powers and Duties.

(a) Within sixty days after its creation, the Zoning Code Commission shall convene its first meeting in the City Council chambers and thereafter the Commission shall meet at least monthly, or no less than 10 times per year, at such times and at such places as determined by the Commission. The Commission shall conduct a comprehensive analysis of and make recommendations regarding reforms to the Philadelphia Zoning Code. The Commission shall analyze the Zoning Code to determine each section's intent, its impact on residential, commercial and industrial development, the costs associated with the Zoning Board of Adjustment including its current caseload and whether the Code may be consolidated or simplified to make it more consistent and easy to understand and to reduce the number of hearings heard by the Zoning Board of Adjustment while still maintaining community input and neighborhood controls. The Commission shall also compare the Zoning Code to the zoning code in jurisdictions that have experienced growth in residents and businesses, using accepted models of

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analysis. The Commission's work shall be guided by the principles that Philadelphia's Zoning Code should be consistent and easy to understand, and should enhance and improve Philadelphia's development approval process while encouraging positive development and protecting the character of Philadelphia's neighborhoods. The Commission shall, subject to the availability of appropriations, appoint and fix the compensation of an executive director and such other staff as may be required for the proper conduct of its work (provided that the appointment of an executive director shall require a vote of two-thirds of all the members of the Commission), and it shall invite the participation of any staff or Commission members of each of the appointing authorities listed in subsections 3-807(a), (b) and (c), as well as utilize any available resources, studies or reports of any such appointing authority. The Commission may also, subject to the availability of appropriations, retain as consultants any organization or individual with regionally or nationally recognized expertise in city planning or zoning. All departments, boards, commissions and other City agencies shall cooperate fully with the Commission in the performance of its duties and responsibilities and shall provide any and all documents, data, analyses or other information related to construction, development and zoning requested by the Commission, except documents the nondisclosure of which is legally privileged or which have been prepared for or by the Law Department for use in actions or proceedings to which the City is or may be a party, and provided that the Commission shall maintain the confidentiality of any documents, data, analyses or other related information upon the written request by any City agency that the material being provided to the Commission be treated as confidential. The Commission shall hold at least two public hearings in the Council chambers to receive testimony from the public concerning zoning code reform. These hearings shall be in addition to those hearings required for the consideration of any legislation the Commission submits to Council.

(b) On or before June 30, 2008, unless Council by a resolution adopted by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Council approves an extension, the Commission shall by a vote of two-thirds of all members of the Commission adopt a written report containing specific recommendations solely related to proposed changes to the Philadelphia Zoning Code, ("Zoning Code Proposals"), including drafts of all legislation required to implement the Zoning Code Proposals, and recommendations on how to proceed with a comprehensive revision of the City's zoning maps ("Zoning Map Proposals"). The Commission shall provide copies of its report to each of the Commission's appointing authorities and to each member of Council and to the Clerk of Council, and the Commission shall see to it that copies are provided to all public libraries in the City and that a copy is posted on the City's official Internet site. The Commission shall also publish and distribute with its report any minority report adopted by three or more members of the Commission.

(c) After issuing its report, the Commission shall thereafter be reconvened

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only as directed by a resolution of the Council adopted by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Council, provided that no such resolution reconvening the Commission shall be adopted until at least five years have elapsed since the date the Commission adopted its last report. Within sixty days after adoption of such a resolution, new members of the Commission shall be appointed in accordance with the appointment process set forth in Section 3-807, provided that any former member of the Commission may be reappointed as a member of the Commission.

(d) Within one hundred twenty days after the Commission issues its report, Council shall either enact into law, reject or table the Commission's Zoning Code Proposals in their entirety.

(e) Within sixty days of any adoption by Council of the Commission's Zoning Code Proposals, the Philadelphia City Planning Commission shall adopt or reject the Commission's Zoning Map Proposals in their entirety. If the Philadelphia City Planning Commission rejects the Commission's Zoning Map Proposals, the Philadelphia City Planning Commission shall simultaneously adopt an alternate proposed comprehensive revision of the City's zoning maps.

The Commissioner of Public Property is hereby authorized to execute and deliver to the Redevelopment Authority of the City of Philadelphia, without consideration, deed conveying conditional fee simple title to 528, 532, 534 & 536 W. Dauphin Street, 3132 (parcel A), 3132 (parcel B) 3424 & 3426 N. Franklin Street, 2900 N. Front Street, 1709-15 Gillingham Street, 205 E. Lippincott Street, 2440-44 Mascher Street, 2018 Orthodox Street, 4563 Palethorp Street, 3029 N. Water Street, 1724 & 1945 Waterloo Street & 307 E. William Street pursuant to Chapter 16-400 of The Philadelphia Code, under certain terms and conditions.

SECTION 2. The Redevelopment Authority is hereby authorized to dispose of the aforementioned property for rehabilitation and/or improvements under certain terms and conditions pursuant to Chapter 16-400 of The Philadelphia Code.


